Annual Cricket Encounter Hartley OBA vs Jaffna Hindu OBA

This year, two games were played, one with traditional leather ball and the other one with composite ball. Only players from Hartley/Jaffna Hindu were allowed to play in the serious leather ball game whereas children were allowed to play in the other game. We witnessed a huge turn out this year in terms of players and spectators. Members brought variety of food dishes to entertain all who attended.

Game1- Leather ball

Things did not go as well as we hoped. Jaffna Hindu came out very strongly with a lot of current players. Dropping eight or so catches did not help Hartley's cause either. Jaffna Hindu won the toss and elected to bat first totalling a huge score of 239 runs for the loss of 7 wickets in the allotted 30 overs. In reply, Hartley could only muster mere 106 runs in 23 overs losing all the wickets. Only notable contribution of 26 came from captain Keeran.

It was pleasing to see some of the senior players like Manoharathas and Dr.Ragavan (travelled all the way from Canberra) participating in the game and also bowling very well with those aging legs. It was nice to see Amirthalingham winning the best fielder trophy for the 2nd consecutive year. Perhaps there is a message in this for the youngsters!

Game2 – Composite ball

The second cricket game was totally a different story altogether, Hartley College won the game easily. Jaffna Hindu managed to score only 138 runs losing all the wickets in the allotted 25 overs. Hartley reached the target of 139 runs with the loss of one wicket. Vasee was among the run scorers making 68 not out. Some of our youngsters proved too good for Jaffna Hindu team. Theeban and Athiththan took 3 wickets each. Vaseeharan was awarded the best batsman title whilst Mahen Manoharadas was awarded with the best fielder award.

Dr.V.Kunanandam- An ACCOLADE TO A HARTLEYITE WE LOST

As if the sufferings of the Tamils in Sri Lanka were not enough, fate dealt them a big blow in August, in the form of the loss of Dr.Kunanandam. Those of us who escaped to be abroad have lost almost the only one of us who had the guts and commitment to give up the cushy and safe life in the west, to return to Jaffna to serve our kith and kin. Kunanandam had given up his settled position as a neurosurgeon in the UK around 1997, in order to work in Jaffna- he did this despite the fact that he had to leave his wife and two children back in the UK.

Kunanandam was unique in DOING things rather than getting a name for it. He was quietly efficient and did not bother to seek recognition. That was the way he was at Hartley too where he studied from 1955 to 1964. His elder brother V Nithyanandam is also a well-known Hartleyite. We all knew Kunanandam as a helpful and kind senior who showed an interest in research, and wanted to emulate him. When I last met him, in Jaffna in 2003, I could see he had dedicated his life to providing better medical care for the Tamil population and better medical education to the ever-suffering Jaffna medical undergraduates and postgraduates.

I knew him also as a senior at the Peradeniya University, and here too he progressed serenely, qualifying in 1970 and went on to train in neurosurgery. He came to UK in 1977 and obtained his Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons, and returned to Jaffna in 1981. He came back to UK due to the political situation in Sri Lanka and proceeded to obtain the Fellowship in Surgical Neurology, and became a real doctor when he achieved his PhD in Medicine (neuroscience).

Kunanandam was Visiting Professor of Surgery and Honorary Consultant Surgeon at the Jaffna General (Teaching) Hospital from 1997 and held the Faculty of Medicine together. He was responsible for obtaining the CT scanners for the hospital and continued his research even in those difficult circumstances.

Kunanandam in his final year was responsible for setting up the Eastern University in Batticaloa, the new Faculty for Medical/Health Sciences and was in fact Acting Dean of that Faculty. He was made a member of the University Grants Commission in March 2006, but a sudden illness struck him soon thereafter, and he passed away peacefully on 6th August 2006 in Southampton, UK.

He leaves his wife, Selvarani, a daughter Thushitha who has followed in her father's footsteps to be a surgeon, and a son, Suren, who has emulated his father in obtaining a PhD.

Kunanandam was an unsung hero in his own motherland, among his own people, but Hartley can be proud of this son, and we as Hartleyites will feel a glow, just like the common trees that feel scented by standing next to a sandalwood tree.

Summary of the Address Given by the Principal to Colombo OBA Branch in July 2007

Mr N Theivendraraja, the principal of our college, addressed the Colombo OBA branch on the 23rd July and here are some of the highlights of his address.

Strength of the College: At present, the school is equipped with 54 full time tutorial staff and 10 non-academic staff. Out of 54 academic staff, 32 have University Degrees and 22 are fully trained teachers having teachers' qualifications. Further, 21 teachers are the members of Sri Lanka Teachers Service, Class - I category. It is pleased to note that 6 teachers have Masters Degree whilst another 3 teachers are currently following Masters degree. The Sectional heads need to be dressed professionally and they have been provided with a separate room. Principal is receiving reports from the Sectional Heads on a daily basis in the evening.

School Academic Development Activities: With a view to enhancing the school academic activities, Quality Circles have been formed for the following:

- Library Development
- Geometry Knowledge Development
- English Language Activity Room
- Environmental Development

Island wide Examination Results: Out of 138 students sat the examination in December 2005, 111 students are eligible to follow the GCE (A/L) classes. 72 pupils passed the mathematics with A grade and 1 student passed all 10 subjects with A grades whilst 6 students passed 9 subjects with A grades. Further, 5 Students sat English Literature as the 10th Subject.

Out of the students who sat for the GCE (A/L) examination in April 2006, 64 students have been selected to follow various courses in the Universities and the details are as follows:

- Mathematics Stream: Engineering -09, Quantity Surveying-02, Physical sciences-11, Applied Sciences-11
- Biology Stream: Medicine-02, Veterinary-01, Food and Nutrition-01, Bio Science-04
- Commerce and Arts Stream: Commerce-03, Arts-25

Academic Competition: Hartley College is still leading in the Jaffna District on the basis of the number of students admitted to the Universities to read for various Degrees. Pupils from various grades participate in the district; provincial and national level academic competition. Under-19 Chess Team became the Champion in the North-East Province whilst Under-15 Chess Team became the runners up.

Building Development Activities: Already commenced construction activities for 3 buildings, viz, Sports spot of 40x20, Activity Room of 50x25 and Co-curricular activity room of 90x25, at a total cost of Rs. 8 million by SDC (a Non Governmental Organisation). The Education Department has allocated Rs.2 million for GCE (A/L) Science lab and Departmental officials are very helpful to putting up this science lab. The North-East Provincial Council has allocated Rs.4.2 million for an Assembly Hall and school is thankful to Mr S Thiyagalingam-Secretary to Provincial Education Ministry for this allocation. The World Food Organisation (WFO) has allocated Rs.2 million for the construction of kitchen whilst at present it provides meals to Grade 6 to 9 students.

Field Study Centre: A Field Study Centre has been established at our School and it is the first field study centre established in the Jaffna district. The Purpose of the centre is to encourage students in the field of Science. Schools that don't have laboratory facilities can also use this facility. The education Department is responsible for the operation and maintenance of this centre. The teacher in charge of this centre is Mr.S.Kokularajan, a member of our tutorial staff.

Students Matters: All pupils need to dress properly with tie and shoes and they look smarter these days with our uniform. Grade 6 to 9 students need to pay obeisance to their parents with a view to enhance the rapport and mutual understanding between the parents and pupils we have introduced this obeisance programme.

TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT FOR 2006-07

The Association's activities from July to October 2006 had very little impact on the overall financial position. A total of \$350 was incurred on Tennis tournament, Cricket matches and wreath. We received \$600 from life membership and \$200 for the upkeep of the computers at Hartley. The accumulated fund marginally increased to \$14,869 from \$14,500 at 30 June 2006.

As disclosed the provisional Receipts and Expenditure Account for the Annual Dinner 2006 reflects a deficit of \$431. Final reconciliation will be completed and the final accounts will be reported in the Annual General Meeting 2007.
