

### TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

The committee and the school thank you all for your generous donations. I congratulate every one of you for your philanthropic consideration and your kind heartedness.

The Association's equity supported by cash improved marginally from \$17,375 to \$17,413. We received \$7,471 and spent \$7,710 giving a deficit of \$239 for the year. Our annual benefit show was held after the year end as such it is not reported in the financial report.

The number of life members rose from 100 to 108 and we hold the membership fund of \$10,277 as a restricted fund that cannot be used for operational expenses.

Key transactions for the year included:

- Surplus from Annual Dinner was \$751 (deficit \$358 in 2007)
- Received contribution for computer project \$600 (\$500)
- Life membership received \$800 (\$1,600)
- Members donated \$550 (\$260) for school projects
- There were no special purpose donations during the year
- We received \$500 and sent \$2,650 for the Water Tank project for the school due to its urgency
- Expenses incurred on sporting activities \$735 (\$578)
- Spent on school computer laboratory maintenance \$300(\$300)
- Payment for prizes to track athletes have not been sent (2007-\$200)
- Remitted \$260 to the Principal for minor expenses

I appreciate the fellowship of the membership.

It gives me great pleasure to forward this message for the Souvenir published on the occasion of the AGM/Annual Dinner scheduled for the 27<sup>th</sup> of September 2008.

The NSW branch has always played an active role, in supporting the redevelopment activities at the school, in addition to setting up and supporting the activities of the Hartley College PPA Trust. As done in the past this year too, the Branch collected and remitted funds for the set up of a water tank, however we have not disbursed the funds yet, since there is a possibility of obtaining funds for the same project from Government or an NGO, in which event funds would be used for another purpose with the consent of the NSW Branch.

As for news about school, it is not a surprise that, over the past 18 months we were forced to shelve some of the major development plans the Trust undertook recently with the assistance of the global branches and some INGO's given the ground situation in the North and East. However we are pleased to report that the school is in the process of obtaining the initial grant from the government to start building the much awaited college Auditorium at the land purchased by the Trust, from funds sent by Global branches including the NSW Branch. We believe by end of 2009, the initial stage of the building should be in place. The other good news from the school is that despite the ground situation, the school delivered better than previous year's results in the GCE AL and OL exam and has also begun to demonstrate capabilities in sports, music and quiz related activities both in the regional as well as National level.

On behalf of the Trustees I wish the event a great success.

On the first day, as President, Abraham Lincoln entered to give his inaugural address, just in the middle, one man stood up. He was a rich aristocrat.

He said, "Mr. Lincoln, you should not forget that your father used to make shoes for my family". And the whole senate laughed; they thought they had made a fool of Abraham Lincoln.

But Lincoln - and that type of people are made of a totally different mettle. Lincoln looked at the man and said, "Sir I know that my father used to make shoes in your house for your family, and there will be many other here... because the way he made shoes; nobody else can. He was a creator. His shoes were not just shoes, he poured his whole soul in it. I

want to ask you, have you any complaint? Because I know how to make shoes myself; if you have any complaint I can make another pair of shoes. But as far as I know, nobody has ever complained about my father's shoes. He was genius, a great creator and I am proud of my father".

The whole Senate was struck dumb. They could not understand what kind of a man Abraham Lincoln was. He had made the 'Shoe Making', an art, a creativity. And he was proud because his father did the job so well that not even a single complaint had ever been heard.

It does not matter what you do. What matters is how you do it - of your own accord, with your own vision, with your own love. Then whatever you touch becomes gold.

### The Draughtsman from Scotland

In our life we come across individuals who help to shape our character, the general outlook on life and also our way of thinking. My life has not been an exception. As a student at Hartley I was fortunate to have studied under some versatile and dedicated teachers who motivated me to do well in life. And I am thankful to God for it. In this article I would like to introduce you to a person whom I met in The Hague, the administrative capital of the Netherlands. His influence on me has been a significant one. And a rewarding one at that.

In October 1971, I began my life as a post-graduate student at Delft, The Netherlands. And I was boarded in a Pension Hall in The Hague and commuted by tram to Delft. It was the beginning of winter, the air was cold and the sky overcast for most of the time. For me it was a drastic change not only weather-wise but mainly because of the absence of friends and relatives. It was in this setting that I met John O'Hara. He was a Scot and a draughtsman by profession. And he was working for Aramco, the oil company in The Hague. He too like me was an inmate of the same Pension Hall.

John was a lively character, well read, and who loved good food. To keep himself physically fit he would walk four to five kilometres everyday, weather permitting. Being a typical Scot, he was very frugal! And he was brilliant at solving cryptic crosswords. After work in the evening he would walk straight into the restaurant at the Pension Hall with that day's Daily Telegraph, a daily from UK. While taking his meal he would also tackle the cryptic crossword from the Daily Telegraph. In my case, while being seated next to him at the same table, I would eat my food and at the same time scan the sports pages of Daily Telegraph for the cricket scores and other sports news.

One day, John wanted my help in solving a clue from that day's crossword! I can still remember that clue. It read as: *sunset nay for an eastern leader (3 words)*. To me who was used to solving simple straightforward crosswords, it was a different kettle of fish. So I told John that it was beyond me. But John was not the type of person who would take no for an answer. Then he started explaining to me that the clue was an anagram of *sunset nay* and that the solution should be the name of a famous leader from the East. This made me think in real earnest. And I realised that it could be a Chinese name. Then, I remembered the name of Sun Yat-Sen, the Chinese statesman and Revolutionary. John was delighted.

The formation of a word by transposing the letters of another word or a phrase, fascinated me. And when I conveyed this to John, what he told me was: "Well, if you are willing then I can teach you the basics of cryptic crossword." Now, after thirty-six years of 'crossword pleasure', my appetite for crossword puzzles has not diminished. And especially after coming over to this Country, it has grown by leaps and bounds!

What started as a casual dinner time activity, way back in 1972, now keeps me turning the pages of dictionaries, encyclopaedia and all sorts of books, on a regular basis. All because of an affable fellow from Edinburgh, in Scotland, by the name of John O'Hara, whom I met in the Dutch city of The Hague.

### **My Reminiscences**

P. Balasingam

Reminiscences are seldom appreciated if the essay is an unsolicited one as it is often a stratagem to blow one's own trumpet. It would nevertheless be welcome if it is a response to a formal invitation and the invitee is under an obligation to comply. The kind request of the Editor of the Hartley College Miscellany seeking my recollections as a past Principal therefore makes me very comfortable and duty bound to write mine.

A college magazine endeavours primarily to record important events and achievements of the school for the enlightenment of posterity. As the period of my service marks a watershed in the history of our college some interesting and exciting experiences of mine do seem relevant and undoubtedly compulsory.

I have tried my best to be selective and concise in my submission keeping dates and figures to an absolute Mr. Balasingam was the Principal at Hartley College from 1985 to 1993.

During his tenure of office Hartley produced outstanding achievements.

As such, Hartley College was made the Lead school of a Cluster of 13 schools in Point Pedro with Mr. Balasingam as the Head.

This article gives an insight into the trying circumstances that prevailed at Vadamaradchy during his time.

minimum avoiding an appropriation of too many pages in the Miscellany as I am aware of the current high costs of publications. My impoverished memory and my separation from my college records by a long time and distance also do not permit an elaborate composition. It is hoped that any omission of a fact or figure thereby incurred would not be taken as an act of commission.

I became Principal in August 1985 when Hartley was a refugee at Puttalai MV owing to a ruthless declaration of the Point Pedro town area as a High Security Zone by the Sri Lankan military. Fortunately a brilliant and grateful past pupil of our college, C. Tharmalingam, was the Principal there at that time. He rallied to our help, like a Good Samaritan, anesthetizing our tribulations immensely with his large heart.

The accommodation he gave to his alma mater, winning the co-operation of his staff, students and the community around, was an amazing blend of magnanimity, love, empathy and sympathy. Giving us the exclusive use of his office room, the college hall, a two storied building and the school's agriculture compound he virtually made it difficult to identify which school was the refugee- his or ours!

In this humane and hospitable environment we were able to keep up the splendour of our college as high as ever in both the curricular and co-curricular fields. My successor and one of my excellent friends, K. Nadarajah, has given a graphic portrayal of our achievements in the 1983/94 Miscellany. Though he has gracefully acknowledged my contribution I feel bound to say it was a collective achievement of my team of friendly colleagues and our brilliant pupils.

It would be superfluous for me to repeat the events he had so well chronicled. Therefore I shall confine myself to some interesting experiences I had. The effort, however, is daunting as an avalanche of memories suddenly assails my worn out faculties! So much so I feel somewhat like the mosquito in a joke that was wandering indecisively around a nude human body wondering from where to begin its first bite!!

My period saw two military operations of the Sri Lankan and Indian forces and as the head of one of the leading schools in the island I was commandeered into willy-nilly associations with them. I had to walk a tight rope without treading on the corns of the military or the militants. Though destiny threw me into this predicament, God whom I always beg and beseech, blessed me with the necessary fortitude to withstand triumphantly all the stress and strain it entailed.

Immediately after the infamous Vadamaradchy operation, I was one of those summoned by the Sri Lanka army to attend a public meeting at Vada Hindu Girls College. While the meeting was going on, the Rupavahini crew, that was covering the event, almost coerced me to face an interview. When they asked me for my opinion about the military operation I felt like saying 'I don't know if this is the end of a beginning or the beginning of an end' quoting Winston Churchill. But prompted by an intuition that discretion was the better part of valor I said a few acceptable words simply off my head! The following day the scene was relayed on the morning and evening TV. When at subsequent school seminars in Colombo and Jaffna many Principals recognized me without any introduction I just couldn't gauge whether Rupavahini had lent me popularity or notoriety!

Another day I wish to recall is when I went into the SL army camp sited in our hallowed college premises and indignantly protested to the army General against the arbitrary arrest of hundreds of our Hartleyites the previous day from the holy precincts of Puttalai MV and Pillayar temple. I appealed for their release as the arrest was an arbitrary one of the innocent pupils with a regular school attendance record. The appeal was upheld almost apologetically and all of them were released. The life and career of those students was saved in the nick of time. The gratitude that I reaped from them and their parents and the knowledge that all of them reached great heights in their career remain indelibly tattooed to my heart.

My associations with the IPKF covering three years were more exacting and eventful. During that period I was appointed as the head of the Point Pedro Cluster of thirteen schools by the Director of Education and as the President of the Puloly MPCS Union by the Jaffna Government Agent. These additional hats on my head considerably widened the area of my service and rendered my relations with the IPKF closer, onerous, inordinate and quite often life-threatening. I feel happy to recall that I was able to serve not only my college but also the entire community in Vadamaradchy during many an emergency and round-ups by easing the situation acting as a translator of the furious IPKF commanders at many public meetings by toning down their devastating and derogatory words against our militants into pleasing ones!

At this juncture I feel honour bound to say that though unfortunate circumstances soured their original ministerial mission into a ruthless military one the IPKF had a profound knowledge of our college and consequently a very healthy respect for her and for me. It was this that enabled me to engage their services in de-mining the area in and around our hoary premises, undertake a lot of rehabilitation work, redeem our alma mater from her refugee plight and install her back right royally in Her home.

As their camp stood cheek by jowl with our premises I could not help being in touch with them as I had to be in their good books to release our pupils or teachers who were often arrested in sudden round-ups. This policy was endorsed even by the militants when one dark night three of them armed to the teeth suddenly barged into my home and grilled me with several questions and cleared me out of their suspicion. The experience was eerie and it still rankles in my memory.

It was this delicate, if not diplomatic, policy of mine that enabled me to meet the IPKF and release several students, even one or two militants, above all, one of my best friends and a senior and versatile teacher of ours- N. Gunaseelan. He had been taken captive to the KKS camp but in response to my convincing representation that the college had been paralysed by his arrest the commander at the Manthikai camp relented. The extent of the confidence he had in me was such that the following day he sent a jeep to my home inviting me to come and take personal custody of Gunaseelan. Declining politely the transport I went on my bike thanked the commander profusely and took Guna, as we fondly call him, to his home. This stands as one of the proud moments in my life. I am happy that subsequently he became a Principal of Hartley and earned a great name.

Another unforgettable moment comes to mind. It occurred during the time when there was a massive search for the great Anton Balasingam. All vehicles on the road were stopped and searched. One day the CTB bus in which I was travelling was stopped at Manthikai and finding

this poor Balasingam an army Junior immediately got hold of me thinking he had caught the elusive one the IPKF were after! My protests in English fell on deaf years as the officer knew only Hindi. On his message the local Chief rushed to the spot to get the 'prize catch' only to be disappointed that it was I whom he knew well enough. He was very apologetic for the mistaken identity and chided the officer. Then he asked me jokingly whether there was anything common with Anton Balasingam as I shared his name. When I replied that we both shared only diabetes he laughed heartily commending my sense of humour and let the bus proceed.

Hartley College did very well during my tenure that coincided with the eight years a Hartleyite goes through from Year Six to Year Twelve. We had a fine team of friendly colleagues on our staff who carried the students through a wide field of academic, cultural and social disciplines along with sports and games and put them on the highway to the Universities and professional careers in our country and abroad. Many of the pupils of my period are today shining high in many a capital in the world boosting the ever growing luster of our Bounteous Mother and giving me, along with the other Principals and the teachers, the serene joy and privilege of basking in Her reflected glory.

It would be fascinating to give out the names of my colleagues and students but sincere concerns and constraints nip the urge in the bud. It would consume pages and pages of the Miscellany. Also if anything is left unsaid what is said would beget unwelcome heartburns. The effort may end up, as a "koon pirai nethi enral kurrai mugam irrundu pawgum" essay to quote a famous tamil poet! The 1983/94 Miscellany is recommended for anyone interested in the names.

However, at this juncture my gut feelings tell me, all my colleagues will welcome, may indeed demand, that I make an exception to the above constraint in the case of K. V. Ponnampalam who was our Deputy Principal during my period. Blessed with great qualities of head and heart he was such a quintessence of amiability, tact and politeness that everyone of us held him high in our esteem and love. Above all he was my alter ego and in the context of the Cluster System and its attendant duties and responsibilities that often kept me away from my table he acquitted himself creditably as the virtual Principal. Thanks to him nobody found my performance wanting in anything and I deem it a privilege to record my grateful appreciation of his service at Hartley College.

My recollections will be found deficient if I fail to acknowledge the magnificent and timely aid and assistance our College received from the TRO, FORUT, the ADB and from our own marvellous rainbow of PPA in Pt. Po., Colombo, London, Canada/USA and Australia. We couldn't have succeeded as we did in restoring the vigour and vitality of our College without their help. The Colombo PPA with their classic celebration of our alma mater's ter-jubilee in 1989 made the Government of Sri Lanka issue a commemorative stamp and had the whole world salute her blue and red flag. This event and the wonderful receptions given to me on my retirement by the entire college, our tutorial and ancillary staff, Prefects Union, Scouts Squad and later by the PPA in Pt.Po, Colombo, London, and Canada shall remain ever green in my grateful memory. I end these recollections with my thankful prayers to God for the merciful guidance and guardianship He gave me throughout my tenure.

## Hartley College Completes 170 Years in Sphere of Education

The arrival of the British in Sri Lanka laid the foundation for the beginning of the growth of the Methodist schools especially after it had removed the ban on the Missionaries by the East India Company by an Act of Parliament in 1813. The Missionaries waited for this opportunity and made arrangements for the expedition in the East.

It was at this time that John Wesley's Lieutenant Dr. Thomas Cook who had the reputation of having converted millions of people to Christianity sold his property and set sail for Ceylon (Sri Lanka) as it was then called, with six other Missionaries in spite of his old age, in December 1813 though Dr. Thomas Cook died, five Missionaries arrived near Galle on June 29, 1814 and two of whom namely Lynch and Squance came to Jaffna in August the same year.

Mr. Maniccavasagar has contributed many articles on Hartley over the past 30 years. We are grateful to him for this beautifully crafted article which gives the history of Hartley from its inception in 1838.

Every Hartleyite should read this account.

After spending some days in the Jaffna peninsula, Rev. Thomas Squance leased out a plot of land from a Nagappar of Point Pedro near the seaside where the present Methodist Girls College is situated. A building was constructed on that plot of land wherein a Tamil school was functioning.

In 1826 Rt. Rev. Peter Percival who was one of the Christian Missionaries came to Ceylon to convert the people of Ceylon to Christianity but in 1830 he was sent to Calcutta to start a mission there.

There his attempt proved futile. Later he came to Ceylon in 1832 when a remarkable change in the administration of British rule occurred as a result of the recommendation of the Colebrooke Commission. This marked the significant event of their religion which eventually had its reflection on the education system.

Rev. Peter Percival started the Jaffna Central School in 1834 and in 1838 started an English School in Point Pedro which was known as Point Pedro Wesleyan Mission Central School. Thus the founding of the school took place due to persistent efforts and aspirations of the Methodist Missionaries.

### **Progress**

The Point Pedro Wesleyan Mission Central School started by Rev. Peter Percival progressed well with about 50 students. However an account of the nature of the people prevailing at that time the number attending the school fluctuated from time to time.

Nevertheless due to the continuous effort and aspirations of Rev. Peter Percival, the General Committee in London was satisfied with the progress of the school and paid Rev. Peter Percival the sum of Sterling Pounds 400 in 1854 which he had incurred as expenses.

Since its inception in 1838 it has been continuously functioning as a school except for a brief interval in 1860. It was in 1861 that the school was re-opened with D. P. Niles, a graduate of the Batticaloa seminary.

As the school headmaster from 1861-1868 he worked hard for the progress of this school and it was evident at a time when Jaffna Central College was in great difficulties on account of Hindu religious revivalism.

When D. P. Niles was transferred to Jaffna Central School Samuel Hensman succeeded him as headmaster of the school. However with the passage of time the number of students started growing and in 1875 it had become a necessity on account of the increasing numbers to shift the school to the present site while allowing the old site to be used for the girls school. It was at this juncture John Chickering Thamotherampillai Sherrard became the headmaster of this school.

He was so closely connected with the school and so popular among the parents of that area and everyone began to call and refer the school as Sherrard's school, instead of using the name Point Pedro Weslevan Mission Central School.

After the retirement of Sherrard the appointed S. A. Paulpillai as its principal. He was a disciplinarian and eventually died in 1906. After his death Stephen S. Kanapathipillai succeeded him as principal. He was a graduate of the Calcutta university. He was a keen sportsman and a soccer player. He taught mathematics and science. He functioned as its principal till 1908 and resigned to do law. In 1912 E. S. Abraham, a graduate of the University of Calcutta was appointed as principal.

The year 1915 marked a turning point in the history of the school when C. P. Thamotheram was appointed as principal. He was a graduate of the University of Madras and during his period of 28 years, significant changes took place. The school was named as Hartley College in 1916 when Rev. Marshall Hartley laid the foundation for a chemistry laboratory.

### Recognition

During Thamotheram's tenure of office, he had capable assistants who played vital role for the development of the college. Notable contribution was made by W. A. Walton who was a veteran in Shakespeare's plays. He inspired the students to take an active part in the Shakespeare's play.

Further, during his time Hartley's results at the Cambridge Examination were exceptionally good, Hartley College earned its recognition as a leading school during Thamotheram's tenure of office. After a long period of 28 years as principal of Hartley College he retired in 1943 at the age of 60.

In 1943, K. Pooranampillai succeeded him as principal of Hartley College. He was a graduate of the London University and a post graduate trained at Selly Oak College, Birmingham.

Indeed, Poornampillai's period was 'golden era' in the history of Hartley College. The academic standard was maintained. He made the college a place for the acquisition of skills necessary for life.

In order to achieve this objectives, he widened the scope for extra curricular activities and formed school societies. It was during his period the gymnasium was inaugurated, additional classrooms too were put up. Poornampillai had his own system of conducting the examinations. He conducted the weekly test, monthly test and the term test and examined the performance of every pupil and brought it to the notice of the parents.

After relinquishing of office by Poornampillai as principal of Hartley College, Ratnasabapathy (1967-1971), C. Rajadurai (1971-1973), P. Ahambaram (1973-1975) and W. N. S. Samuel (1975-1985) functioned as principals with great acceptance both by the students and the parents.

Thereafter S. P. Balasingam, a distinguished old boy of Hartley College who strained every nerve of his to keep the flag of Hartley College flying amidst tension and turmoil when he was appointed as principal of Hartley College.

### Contribution

Despite the turmoil and tribulations in the Jaffna peninsula in particular and the country in general Hartley College has not failed in its duty to hold the torch of learning, burning aloft and mould its students as useful citizens of the country. The present principal N. Theivendrarajah

who pilots the affairs of Hartley College is a science graduate (BSc) from the University of Peradeniya.

In 1985 he obtained his science degree and in 1994 he completed his Post Graduate Diploma in Education from the University of Colombo.

In 2002, he got a Postgraduate Diploma in Education Management from the National Institute of Education and Master in Education from the University of Jaffna in 2003.

In 1986, he got his appointment as a graduate teacher at Warakapola and in 1999 he was promoted to Sri Lanka Educational Administrative Service. Further, he was appointed as principal of Hartley College on 5.12.2005. Prior to this he functioned as Director of Education attached to the Department of Education, Dehiowita.

In fact, Theivendrarajah is a remarkable personality who discharged his responsibilities with distinction. He is constantly pragmatic and practical in his approach to the problems of the college and willing to seek out and accept solutions wherever they could be found. He always puts his heart and soul into the activities of the students and identify himself with them.

Further, two students namely Vimalanathan Rajeevan and Sri Sothinathan Nimalan have done extremely well in the GCE (A/L) 2007 in the maths stream and bio stream.

In fact, Rajeevan has come first in the All Island through Tamil medium and third in all mediums taken together. Even Nimalan has achieved excellent results in the Jaffna district in the bio stream. Theivendrarajah is a highly disciplined individual who translates thoughts and intentions into action, every minute into valuable moments. Indeed, he should be highly commended for piloting the affairs of Hartley College with unsurpassed distinction and unsullied honour.

Besides all these, the Hartley College Past Pupils Association (Colombo branch) main objects met and discussed about necessary requirements for the advancement of social welfare as may be conducive to the interior and well-being of past and present pupils of the college, to make all efforts which may be necessary to ensure that students leaving Hartley after their education, pursue their higher education in universities in Sri Lanka or abroad and to secure suitable employment, to honour past pupils who reach distinguished status, academic/professional excellence.

### **Funds**

Further, the College provides scholarships and funds for various purposes. It has school development fund, sports fund, Vairamuttu memorial fund, S. S. Somasundaram memorial fund, S. C. Rasaratnam memorial fund, K. Ganeshalingam foundation fund, Prof. Thurairajah memorial scholarship fund, K. Pooranampillai memorial scholarship fund, T. Kangadaran memorial cricket fund, Nesamani Mahesan memorial fund, Rajaratnam Family Foundation (Ceylon) Ltd.

Even gold medals are presented to all students who obtain 3As at the Advanced Level examination. In fact, the college had its ups and downs due to the conditions that prevailed and the difficulties and problems encountered. However overcoming these problems and progress achieved in the spheres of education and sports from its inception is purely due to the dedicated services which the principals, students, parents, past pupils' associations both local and abroad.


### 5. AUDITOR


